### From the Pastor

Happy All Saints' Day! Happy Veterans' Day! Happy Thanks-giving! Happy New Year! (November 30-Advent begins the liturgical year in the church) Gosh, there are a lot of holidays in the month of November, some secular and some liturgical, but still...... a lot.

All Saints Day occurs on November 1, and it is the day that we remember all of our saints, both known and unknown, who have formed that great cloud of witnesses in heaven. On Veterans Day we honor living and deceased men and women who have served in any branch of the U.S. Armed Forces. When we celebrate Thanksgiving, we generally think of the Pilgrims who landed in Plymouth in 1621 and their shared meal with the Native Americans, but today it also a time when most of us gather with friends and family and share times of gratitude and blessing. Finally, Advent is the beginning of the Church's liturgical year, and we change to a new year in the Lectionary. (there are years A, B, and C). It begins the time of waiting for the Savior and spans the 4 Sundays before Christmas.

When I was a chaplain in a retirement community, we listed all the names of all residents who had passed away in the last year in the Vespers bulletin and often lit candles or rang a bell after each name. Because of the setting, there were always 12-20 names each year. It was a nice way to remember those who went to join the Church Triumphant.

My father was a Navy Veteran, and I admit that I don't pay as much attention to this holiday as I should. He never served in a war, but he was awfully proud of his service, especially as he got older. And as I get older and my father is now gone, I appreciate this day so much more.

Thanksgiving is one of my favorite holidays, and I am always in PA with my brother and his family and my now 94-year-old mother. We don't cook a big meal as we once did, but it is so much fun just being together. My 3 children and their families are also in PA at that time, so we all get together too.

I used to say that Christmas was my favorite holiday, but it is actually the time of Advent, the weeks leading up to December 25 that bring me the most joy. I love getting ready for the big day!

My wish for all of you for November is to celebrate all of the holidays, or at least mark them in some way. "I thank my God upon every remembrance of you, Always in every prayer of mine for you all making request with joy, For your fellowship in the gospel from the first day until now; Being confident of this very thing, that he which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ." Philippians 1: 3-6- King James Version

Thanksgiving began with a 1621 harvest feast shared by Plymouth colonists and the Wampanoag people, but it wasn't a national holiday until President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed it as one in 1863. Before 1863, individual colonies and states held their own thanksgiving days for various reasons, and it wasn't until 1941 that Congress passed a law officially establishing it as the fourth Thursday in November.

# What is the meaning of Christ the King Sunday?

Each year on the Sunday before Advent begins, we in the church celebrate the liturgical day known as Christ the King Sunday. This year we will mark that day on November 23.

What is it exactly? Christ the King Sunday celebrates Jesus Christ's spiritual kingship and dominion over all creation. It was instituted by Pope Pius XI in 1925 to counter growing secularism and remind believers of their ultimate allegiance to Christ rather than to earthly powers. The feast is celebrated on the last Sunday of the liturgical year before Advent, emphasizing that Christ's reign is both a present reality in the lives of believers and a future hope for the ultimate culmination of his kingdom.

I truly enjoyed interviewing Beth for our newsletter this month. She has a fascinating story to tell. Thank you Beth for allowing me to interview you!

Beth told me she grew up in the church as she attended with her parents. As a teenager she lost interest, and many years passed when she didn't attend church at all. Her daughter, Stephanie, who was her only child, passed away on April 23, 2020. She was completely devastated and realized she needed to get closer to God. She returned to First Presbyterian in September 2020. She met Pastor Dan for the first time at her daughter's funeral.

Beth grew up right here in Ocean City and had a wonderful childhood back then. She told me OC was a much better place for a child to grow up. Her and her friends would ride their bikes over the 50 bridge to spend the day. Beth told me her Mom

taught Sunday School and her Dad was an Elder. Additionally, when First Presbyterian moved to its present location in the 1960's and purchased

their first set of chimes, her Dad built a wooden box to house them.

Beth's favorite Bible verse is; Revelation 21:4 "He will wipe every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away."

Beth's hobbies and interests are beadwork and jewelry design, just for fun. Also, she's a member of the Ocean City Jeep Club group which participates in several charity events for the community. Beth shared with me she has a doll collection because she's still a kid at heart. One doll in her collection is very special to her; it is an American Girl doll

that resembles her daughter, Stephanie. This particular doll is a unique and beautiful way to memorialize her daughter.

She is currently a deacon and attends WOW meetings when she's not working. Beth told me the thing she loves the most about our church is the many friendships she's acquired since returning to it. At

first she felt like a prodigal but she was so warmly welcomed and accepted just as she is. Her favorite hymn to sing at our church is "They Will Know We

Are Christians By Our Love."

When I asked Beth if she had any pets she quickly replied, "Oh yes!" Turns out she has four cats, 8 birds, most of which belonged to her daughter Stephanie.

Finally, Beth told me she works at the Ocean City Golf Club where she helps to keep the golf course looking pretty. She loves her job so much that it never feels like work.

# This month I want to share the story of how I became a member of First Presbyterian Church of Ocean City, Maryland....

In 2019, OC Buddy and I were living in downtown Ocean City on 10<sup>th</sup> Street. My precious Mama passed away in 2018 and we were all alone.

We loved our new apartment on the second floor with a huge porch overlooking downtown OC. Buddy loved to sit on my chaise lounge while keeping watch over the city.

One morning on our walk, OC Buddy and I heard what sounded like church chimes (something that has always filled my heart with joy). We decided to "follow the music" until we discovered where it was

coming from. We began on 10<sup>th</sup> Street and proceeded down the back alley as we followed the melody of the chimes. Finally, as we approached 13<sup>th</sup> Street we saw a large brick church on the corner. The chimes were even more beautiful the closer we walked.

As OC Buddy and I approached the church door to enter First Presbyterian, we found it unlocked. As we entered the hallway, I could hear voices coming from the pastor's office. I introduced myself and OC Buddy to Pastor Dan and he offered us a seat. Then he asked, "What is it I can do for you today?" I started rambling and crying as I recounted the horrors of my past two years. He offered to pray with me and told us about the church services and activities available. Pastor Dan also graciously told me I could bring Buddy to church anytime I feel I needed his presence and assistance. I believe God used OC Buddy to lead me to First Presbyterian Church that morning.





After my meeting with Pastor Dan, I began to attend First Presbyterian sporadically until one day God got my undivided attention. I was still selfishly doing my own thing. I realized the longer I disobeyed God's calling on my life, the longer I would be tossed to and fro in my daily life. I knew God was telling me to start going to church weekly, not sporadically, and so I began attending church on a regular basis. I have met so many new, dear friends at First Presbyterian and I now serve as a Deacon for the church body.

God patiently waited for me to come to terms with His calling on my life. He began to reveal to me the reason I survived death 8 years ago and the plans He has for my life. I am forever grateful that God is a God of second chances.

### What Is the Meaning of Advent? by Rick Hamlin for Guideposts

For the longest time I figured Advent meant "to wait." Waiting for Christmas to happen, waiting (as a kid) for Santa Claus, waiting for the Christmas tree to go up, waiting for all those presents I hoped to get (and hoping I wasn't too greedy). Was this the true meaning of Advent?

### The Meaning of "Advent"

The root of the word Advent isn't "to wait," it's "to come." And doesn't that make more sense, not just from a logistics standpoint but from a spiritual one?

What is Advent? Advent is the celebration of the coming of Christ. Whether you open windows on an Advent calendar or light candles every evening or look at the Christmas decorations going up around town—unspeakably early it seems to me—you're celebrating the upcoming arrival of a huge holiday.

#### When is Advent?

Advent officially starts the Sunday after St. Andrew's Day or, better put, the first of the four Sundays before Christmas (not counting Christmas). That puts it Sunday, November 30, 2025, giving us time to pray, look at Scripture, sing, set up our creche, all those things you do to honor the season.

### Why Celebrate Advent?

Tis the season, indeed, to be jolly. Why? Because we're looking at not just one coming, one that's already happened, but another that we wait for with great anticipation and joy, the Second Coming.

God stepped down and came to the earth in the form of Jesus, the very Son of God, born to a humble couple from Nazareth, in even humbler circumstances—as the gospel writer Luke showed us—in a stable with a manger for a bed.

We don't have to wonder if it's going to happen because we know it happened already from the accounts we've read. Like celebrating your birthday—it's the Lord's birthday. You know it's coming, that red-letter day marked in the calendar, and you're filled with anticipation of its arrival.

As for Christ's return and the coming of the kingdom of God, there's no human certainty of exactly when that's to happen, only gleaning it from the prophecies in Scripture, and what we do here on earth to further that coming. The sharing of God's love through warmth, kindness, generosity and service.

The very uncertainty of exactly "when" strikes me as a gift. You read Paul's letters and can tell he thought it would happen any moment, and it led to his commitment and devotion and witness. Can we not follow his model? "O come, o come, Emmanuel," we sing at Advent, all our yearning for that good news. And because Christ did come, our yearning is not empty or vain. It bubbles along with the joy of the season. See that star in someone's front yard, shining in the darkness. A reminder of the star that did come, guiding the wise men to the Christ Child.

This is the true meaning of Advent. Christmas is coming. And every decorative reminder out there can speak to our hearts, giving cause for hope and joy.
